HISTORY OF LACROSSE

Lacrosse has always been a compelling sport for those who experience its character and challenges. Many former players' attraction to the game is a life-long commitment. So it is not uncharacteristic to hear tales of people who tried to introduce the sport to this part of the country as far back as the thirties and forties. Regrettably, many of these efforts to play, teach and promote lacrosse eventually fell by the wayside. Usually because there wasn't enough interest, access to equipment or competition within a reasonable distance. Modern lacrosse was officially introduced to the Lone Star State in 1971 and can be traced to a single, infusive event; the now-legendary Johns Hopkins Vs. Navy Game played in Houston's Astrodome during April of that year.

In the fall of 1969 and the spring of 1970, Ralph O'Conner, a John's Hopkins graduate ('51) approached the East Coast lacrosse community with a proposal to spark the development of lacrosse in the Southwest. O'Conner's plan involved the influential Hopkins alums, living in Houston, to bring Bob Scott's Johns Hopkins team to Texas for an exhibition game the following season.

O'Conner enlisted Dr. Cooley, Dr. Jack Burgland, Bob McMurrey, Dermot Riggs, Jim Harrington and several other former lacrosse players to help promote the event throughout the Houston community. They did a remarkable job.

More than 18,000 fans, most of whom had never seen a lacrosse game, appeared in the Astrodome to watch the Midshipman down Johns Hopkins 9-6. Incredible as it seems, that was the single greatest regular season attendance record for any game in the history of collegiate lacrosse and that record stood until the late eighties when teams like Syracuse began drawing massive crowds to their own indoor arena. Of course, only a token percentage of the crowd who attended the charity event had any idea of what they were cheering about. But a couple of fans did.

Two former East Coast players, attending Texas colleges, at the time, made contact through the Astrodome game. Bob Korba was at Southern Methodist University when he learned of the event from friends on the East Coast. He drove from Dallas to Houston to witness a small piece of lacrosse history. From a flyer posted at the game, he recorded the phone number of one Dave Gruber, a graduate student from Oceanside, Long Island who was attending Texas A&M. Several days after the Astrodome game the two made contact, sharing their backgrounds and enthusiasm for the game.

Gruber was seeking interested parties to get together informally on weekends and toss the ball around. A week later Korba called back and challenged him to a game: the soon-to-be-formed Dallas Lacrosse Club against a team from College Station. On a small section of the polo fields in College Station, a single crude goal was erected and lacrosse in Texas became a reality. The Dallas Lacrosse Club arrived with nine players; Texas A&M contributed five. So a six-on-six

scrimmage was all that could be accomplished. No score was kept. There were no officials. But it was a beginning.

In 1972, the first full field game was scheduled in Dallas, Texas A&M didn't travel with enough players to field an entire squad, but the importance of completing a full field, regulation game outweighed any team loyalty. Loaning a goalie and several middies to the Aggies, Dallas won the game by a single goal and another milestone was achieved.

Over the next several years, colleges throughout Texas and Louisiana began to field teams and the sport began to sustain momentum. The post-graduate club teams dominated Texas lacrosse in the mid-seventies and early eighties. As a result of their commitment to the game interest eventually turned toward developing high school programs. Within a few short years former players, converted to coaches, were driving the statewide expansion of scholastic lacrosse. With high school programs on solid ground and a burgeoning influx of youth organizations like the North Texas Youth Lacrosse Association and Hy-Lax, lacrosse in Texas is just hitting its stride.

HISTORY OF GIRLS LACROSSE IN TEXAS

Girls' high school lacrosse in Texas started when a St John's graduate, returning to Houston after playing lacrosse at Middlebury College in Vermont, introduced the sport at St. John's in 1990. So St. John's would have another team to play, Bellaire also started a club team that year. Three more years went by before Lamar, Episcopal and Kinkaid caught the lacrosse fever and started their own teams. In 1993, the first unofficial Texas Girls Lacrosse state championship was won by St. John's, a feat it has repeated four times since then.

In 1995, Ray Maitland, the THSLL Treasurer at the time, spotted a young woman wearing a Colorado State U lacrosse t-shirt in a Dallas restaurant and persuaded her to start a girls lacrosse program in Plano. The Plano Lacrosse Club's earliest games had only 9-10 players who scrimmaged boys, a couple of college teams and anyone else who would play them. A year later, two more North Texas schools, Richardson and Coppell, which already had boys' lacrosse clubs, started girls' club lacrosse teams. A year after that two other schools, Greenhill and Loyola (in Shreveport, LA.) joined ranks.

A somewhat similar incident initiated girls lacrosse in Austin when a Bowie HS student visiting her sister at college in New York state saw her first game of girls' lacrosse. Returning to Texas, she contacted the lacrosse team at UT, and found a player who was willing to coach a team and girls high school lacrosse in Austin was off and running. A year later Austin High School provided Bowie with local competition when they organized a program.

Until 1999, Austin and Dallas lacrosse teams traveled to play each other as part of the Dallas District of the THSLL. But in 1999 three new girls' lacrosse clubs were started in Austin

and two more in Dallas prompting the THSL to divide the Dallas District into two separate Districts: Central and North.

In 2001, just eleven years after it was first introduced in Texas, there are 26 girls' high school teams and 11 women's college teams in the Lone Star State, including three new programs in 2001: Austin College, Stephen F. Austin University and Southwestern University. National organizations such as Nike Lacrosse camps and womenslacrosse.com developmental clinics are targeting Texas as one of their hottest new markets. Texas girls' teams are traveling to tournaments and clinics across the country, including a first-ever appearance at the US Lacrosse National Tournament.

With so many lacrosse players/coaches/enthusiasts relocating here from the eastern part of the U.S. and the fierce commitment that Texas programs are making to improve their mastery of the sport, the explosive growth of women's lacrosse in the Lone Star State is sure to continue.

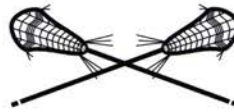
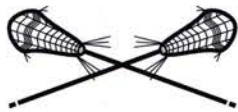

DISTRICT SUMMARIES

NORTH DISTRICT SUMMARY

Men's—Early season rainouts and rescheduling plus late season overtimes, upsets and one goal victories characterized a topsy-turvy season in the High School Boys North Texas Lacrosse District. From top to bottom, the A & B split division format produced the tightest, well-played and fiercely competitive spring lacrosse season in recent memory.

Episcopal School of Dallas nipped St. Mark's for the regular season A Division title. However, tables were turned in the first round of the Division playoffs as Jesuit outlasted 1st seed ESD in overtime and Highland Park pulled away from 2nd seed St. Mark's in the fourth period.

In a season of upsets, Coach Hayward Lee's highly improved ESD Eagles surprised everyone with an early season heart-stopping, one goal win over Highland Park and two gritty, overtime victories against highly regarded St. Mark's. The Eagles patient offense featured middle, Mark Goode, and attackman, James Clement. Defensive ace, Carlos Navarro, anchored a team that displayed tenacity and team defense.

Highly ranked St. Mark's was lead by All-State defenseman and Naval Academy bound James Winston. Former Duke Blue Devil standout and head coach, Derek Thomson, lauded the solid play of attack, Bryan Pryor, and middle, Brooks Baldwin. The duo combined for 52 goals and 23 assists during the Lion's regular season.

Nagging injuries hampered pre-season district favorite Highland Park. HP was snake-bit early in the season in league competition – as they lost three single goal nail biters. A young Plano team, ESD and St. Mark's took them to the mat in road losses. However, defense and goal tending improved while All-State and All-American nominee Ben Compton and attack, Charlie Goyer, ignited a strong second half finish powering Rick Harper's "Fighting Scots" to 8 victories in 9 games.

Perennial power, Dallas Jesuit, experienced highs and lows during the regular season. Twice victim at the hands of inspired Greenhill rallies and LaNon Gillins' goal tending, Jesuit bounced back in the last two weeks to beat Episcopal and Highland Park. Lightning quick, All-State attackman, Craig Nolan and rugged face off man, Louis Gigliotti, helped the Rangers control the offensive end while team defense and goal tending improved over the course of the season.

The B Division race was no less competitive. Shreveport Byrd, "the new kid on the block" in its first year of varsity competition, outlasted Plano East and Coppell for the B Division title. Coach Karl Mitchell's team with a solid commitment from the high school football program, burst upon the scene displaying excellent athletic ability, defense and offensive patience. Midfielders Jay Harper, 11 goals/10 assists, and Kenneth Ortiz, 14 goals/8 assists, spearheaded a team that showed excellent scoring balance.

Plano East's Panthers, which beat Coppell for the first time in five years, 6-5, looks to a solid future. This year's team was powered by underclassmen – notably attackman James Garza, and middle, David Muldovan. Fueled by dynamic growth in the Plano youth program, PESH looks like a solid contender again next year.

In their first year of lacrosse competition, both Southlake and Shreveport Byrd have been major surprises regarding the level of play and the explosive numbers growth of their programs. Coach David Smith's Southlake Carroll Dragons fielded varsity, 7-8 and 5-6 grade teams in their first year of competition. Byrd and Plano East will compete for the B Division Championship held at Houston Strake Jesuit High School on May 5th.

Women's – North District Girls Lacrosse continues to grow. This season we welcomed Southlake to the fold, bringing the District's complement to nine teams. Our J.V. schedule continues to mature, providing valuable experience and playing time to our younger athletes. The North District flourished not only in size, but also in the caliber of play exhibited by the girls. And while the 2001 spring season got off to a rainy start, that didn't dampen the level of play as the girls remained competitive throughout. Competition stepped up another notch this year as many games were determined by only one point, while a number of others were decided in overtime. Several of these close contests were coached and played by young teams, proving they will be formidable opponents in the future. Advancement in the level of play is further reflected in the large number of seniors who will play on the collegiate level next year. Whether on school clubs or intercollegiate teams, these players have shown they have the "right stuff" to compete.

As an illustration of the exciting and hard fought contests this spring, the regular season culminated with ESD battling Greenhill for first place in the season's final game. Greenhill emerged victorious, capping an undefeated regular season and advancing to the four team playoff along with ESD (6 - 2),

Hockaday (6 - 2), and Loyola (4 - 4). The four team playoff tournament matched Hockaday vs. ESD and Loyola vs. Greenhill. Hockaday came back from a 1 - 5 halftime deficit, scoring four goals in the second half, but could not contain ESD as they took a two-goal lead and held it to the final whistle. Greenhill was unyielding in its 12 - 2 victory over Loyola. With both ESD and Greenhill advancing to the District Championship, they were matched head-to-head for the title in what is shaping up to be a classic rivalry.

In an exciting district title match, Greenhill overcame a powerful ESD team in a "take-no-prisoners" contest. Neither team would submit. Each was determined to make their opponent earn a semifinal berth. While the ESD score does not accurately reflect the level of play, Greenhill would not be denied the crown and advanced to represent the North

District in the THSLL State Championships.

CENTRAL DISTRICT SUMMARY

Men's – The Central District, encompassing Austin and San Antonio has grown slowly and steadily over the last several years. Of our 12 teams, nine are from Austin, while three play in San Antonio. A 13th team will be added next year when Cedar Park begins play officially: they have been practicing and picked up a few games this year in preparation. First and second year teams, St. Andrews and St. Michael's, each won a regular season game for the first time in their history, but it was St Andrews who came out on top in the head to head contest. Keystone, in their third year made great strides by keeping playoff hopes alive late into the season. Bowie, who made the playoffs last year, was in a rebuilding mode but with many of their players returning they hope for a playoff run again in 2002.

In a pre-season league-wide meeting, the coaches of the Central District opted out of the B State Championship (by a vote of 11-1) and allow the top two teams in B to advance to the A playoffs. Those two teams were McCallum, who made the playoffs for the second time in three years, and Anderson, with their first playoff appearance ever. While both teams were defeated in the first round, the games were competitive and exciting.

Our A division was more balanced than in past years. Winning for the fourth straight year was St. Mary's Hall, though they were challenged in a few games and had to work for their wins. McNeil, Westlake and Central Catholic battled for what appeared to be a three-way tie. Each team split games with the other two, until the last night of the season when Westlake was able to outlast Austin. A young, much improved Westwood team finished strong by defeating McNeil to end their season on a successful note. Austin High, after a difficult and emotional 8-5 loss to St. Mary's Hall, was unable to maintain its high level of intensity for the season finale against Westlake.

2002 looks good for Central Catholic, Austin High and Westwood as they all have teams with many returning players. The always strong St. Mary's Hall team will again try to defend its title. The Central District will add at least one new team with Cedar Park and could add as many as four with Lago Vista, Killeen Harker Heights and San Antonio-St. Anthony on the drawing board. With a successful 2001 season in the books we look forward to continued excellence and growth in 2002.

Women's – The District started play this year with five varsity teams including veteran teams Austin and Bowie. Anderson High and McCallum High joined forces to produce a team after Anderson had struggled with a shortage of players the past season. Westlake High fielded both varsity and JV teams. St. Andrews continued to show improvement. And a

new team at St. Michael's Academy, under Coach Johanna Sanchez, was formed and played this year as a JV team.

The regular season was dominated by Austin and Bowie. Both teams went 7 and 1 for the season and split their head to head encounters. Austin won the regular season title over Bowie with most total goals head to head.

The Austin High Lady Maroons almost had another undefeated season, being upset by only a single goal by Bowie late in the season and will welcome a whole new coaching staff for the 2002 season. Unfortunately for the rest of the District wanting to unseat Austin, they will return a very strong team next year.

Bowie has been the runner-up to Austin the entire life of the Central District. Their upset win this season was the first and only regular season loss suffered by Austin.

The St. Andrews Crusaders showed they are making great strides in placing Center Ellen Heck on the Texas National Team. Coach Kara Levinson will have a strong returning team next year and St. Andrews will continue to help the District raise its level of play.

Westlake fielded both a varsity and JV team this year. Coach Nicole Griffith is graduating from UT and right now, it looks like her replacement is graduating from Texas A&M this spring and heading to Austin.

Anderson (a joint venture with McCallum High) made a couple of gigantic strides this year. There was a steady supply of players which translated to better play. The first half of the season Anderson was hampered by the lack of a practice and playing facility, but that was changed by the hard work of the coach, Kendra Pearson. Hopefully, next year both schools will field teams.

Coach Johanna Sanchez brought her St. Michael's Crusaders from a figment of the imagination to a solid squad by the season's end. The opportunity to scrimmage against the varsity teams provided invaluable experience to her girls.

To assist our new JV teams, the District played full scrimmages against the non-starters from the varsity teams. One of the District goals is to get enough interest to have full JV competition in the future. We expect six or seven varsity level teams next year and may get a couple of first year schools in the Round Rock area.

The playoffs proved exciting with a major upset bringing a new participant to the Central District championship game. The St. Andrews Crusaders threw a tenacious defense against the powerful offense of Bowie, and shut the Bulldogs down 11-4. St. Andrews, despite a 4-4 regular season showed improvement throughout the season. In the other playoff game, defending champion Austin High stopped Westlake 11-3. The Maroon dominated in all facets of the game and

moved into their third straight District Championship game. Austin High continued its dominance in the Championship game by defeating St. Andrews 12-4. Coach Bonnie Loudon had Austin ready to play and they continued their string of District Championships.

SOUTH DISTRICT SUMMARY

Men's – The South District continued their A and B divisional format in the 2001 season. Three new teams were added to the varsity schedule; Klein Forest, Houston West Side and Strake Jesuit in the B Division. Each team competed at the varsity level with Klein Forest and Strake Jesuit both fielding full JV teams to boot. Pre season tournament play consisted of Cy-Fair and Kingwood hosting their annual tournaments. The Aggieland Classic at Texas A & M University in February was a great event for teams from the league's three districts. The south was represented by Lamar, Kingwood, The Woodlands, Bellaire and Cy-Fair. St. John's, Kinkaid and Episcopal traveled to the East coast during spring break to show their talent in area tournaments.

Conference action got underway in March with St. John's (A-Division) and Bellaire (B-Division) strutting some major talent on the field of play. Both teams wrapped up the season with a perfect 10-0 and 9-0, respectively. Kinkaid, Lamar, Klein Oak, Clear Lake, Fort Bend and Cy-Fair all posted a .500 season or better in their respective divisions with the remaining programs, but two, securing at least one win. First and second place B-Division teams are looking to move up to "A" in 2002. Divisional parity has added two welcome components to the South District's complexion-more start-up programs and competitive equity.

On May 5th and 6th, Houston played host to the first B-Division Championship at Strake Jesuit. Bellaire (seeded #1) will play Plano East (#4 Seed) and Clear Lake (#2 Seed) will play Byrd of Shreveport (#3 Seed).

Middle School lacrosse in the South district has taken on a solid dimension with six teams: River Oaks Baptist, Kinkaid, St. John's, Annunciation, Klein and The Woodlands. ROB emerged as the top team at the end of regular conference competition. Tournament-wise, St. John's Junior Jam continued to attract young teams from all over the state to compete. Fifth and sixth grade action continues to gain momentum as North Houston Lacrosse (The Woodlands), Hy-Lax, West U, Bellaire, and the River Oaks area all fielded at least one team of young stick handlers. As middle school and youth programs mature they will play an integral role in the depth of talent we witness at the high school level in years to come.

It's really great to be a part of the fastest growing sport in America. See you all in Dallas.

Women's – Houston saw another exciting season of great growth. We kicked off the season in January with a terrific clinic, attended by over 150 eager players. The first Texas

travel team was formed, the Houston Heat, modeled after similar East Coast teams encountered at the Vail Shootout. The summer of 2001 will be a busy one, with a Texas girls' team going to the National Tournament, the Houston Heat playing in the All-Star Express and another team going to the Vail Shootout.

The season saw many close games and exciting finishes. St. John's was the only team to make it through regular season with an unblemished record, followed by Lamar, whose only loss came against St. John's. Clear Lake and Kinkaid rounded out the top four, followed by Episcopal, Kingwood, Memorial, The Woodlands, Cy Fair, Bellaire and Klein.

The second annual Houston JV Tournament was held at the Woodlands in mid April. It was a picture-perfect day with over 100 girls competing. St. John's squeaked by Kingwood to win the championship. All coaches were excited to have so many younger players involved as it certainly bodes well for the future.

The fireworks really started during playoffs. Lamar survived two scares to advance to the state tournament. The first came against a feisty Memorial team, who took Lamar to the last minute before falling 11-10; the second came in a tremendous semifinal game against a talented Clear Lake team, which Lamar won 14-13. In the second semifinal game, Kinkaid won a hard-fought 8-6 victory over St. John's to advance to the final four for the first time in two years.

RECORDS & STATS

In 1987, the St. John's School of Houston established the first continuous men's scholastic lacrosse program, under the guidance of Randy Bryant of Houston and organized by Matt Harder, a former player at the University of Texas.

The following year, two additional teams emerged in the Bayou City; Memorial High School and Lamar High School. Memorial and St. John's competed for the first 'state' championship.

By 1989, teams were established in Austin (Westlake HS) and Dallas (Dallas Jesuit). The Texas High School Lacrosse League was founded with Randy Bryant as the first Commissioner of statewide scholastic lacrosse.

The determination was made during the next season to rotate the location of the State Championship Event from Houston to Austin to Dallas, in order to help promote the development of new programs in these regions.

In 1996, the current four-team playoff format was initiated with three regional representatives and a fourth at-large or wild-card bid.

1998 was highlighted by the inauguration of the Women's Division of the Texas High School Lacrosse League and their first State Champion; The St. John's Rebels.

Collecting this statistical data is a "work-in-progress" for the THSLL. Many of the scores and records displayed here have been adapted from files, articles, and memory. The ideal circumstances would be to access the scorebooks of these events to document precise records. Should any of our readers have detailed records, old scorebooks or any source of information, we will gratefully correct any error or omission which occur here.

One of the more challenging dimensions of developing these records is the individual statistics from tournament play. Acquiring this research is a fairly tedious process, and again—any additions or corrections to these ongoing records would be greatly appreciated.

Since the mid-fifties an organization called NILA—the National Interscholastic Lacrosse Association, and the former Lacrosse Foundation, sponsored national recognition for high school athletes through the honorary selection process of scholastic All-Americans, Academic All-Americans and the promotion of a scholastic North Vs. South All-Star Game.

In 1994, the Texas High School Lacrosse League had grown large enough to achieve recognition from this organization as a contributing state-wide association. The THSLL was granted participation in the afore-mentioned categories.

In 1998, NILA merged with US lacrosse, Inc., the national governing body for the sport of lacrosse, under the authority of the US Lacrosse Coaches Council.

To date, there is not a corresponding national awards organization for Women's Lacrosse.
