IN 1995 John LaRue Jr. and Bob Maddox broke their ties with Bruce Nolley's Burkner Richardson Rams Lacrosse team after two years of play and stole away his assistant coach Andy Garrigan to get the ball rolling on Highland Park's first ever Lacrosse Club. There were only 24 members of the original 96 team (23 are featured in the photo below) which was primarily made up of students who signed up through a hacky sack / lacrosse interest club that met once a six weeks during tutorials. After getting permission from Dr. Rutherford, HP's principal at the time, and gathering enough names on the signup sheet, Maddox and LaRue began organizing several "learn the basics of catching and throwing" clinics. The team began practicing as a unit in January of 1996 with head coach Andy Garrigan and assistant coach Bruce Jennings at the helm. The team was entirely made up of HP boys with the exception of one Southlake import, Cory Clay, a midfielder poached from Bruce Nolley's Rams. The team was admitted into Texas' Division II and began competing with all of the teams in the Dallas area, both DI and DII alike, as well as Shreveport's A Team. In the inaugural season, the "Original 96ers" had an incredible season for a first year team, beating well established teams the likes of St. Marks, ESD, Plano, Richardson Burkner, Alan, Plano East, Greenhill, and Coppell, with their only losses coming from Shreveport's A Team and Jesuit. The 96ers went on to beat ESD that year to win the Texas DII Championship, making them the only team to win a championship in a program's first year.

The year after the clubs inception, Bruce Nolley made the move from Burkner and began HP's youth program. The youth program exploded in popularity and began preparing young men for their high school lacrosse careers as a direct result of Nolley's dedication to promoting the sport. Since then, HP DI has won 4 State Championships and the new Developmental DII program (composed entirely of freshman, sophomores, and juniors) has picked up a second DII championship. HP's program has grown by leaps and bounds each year due to the dedication of its great coaches, talented players, a devoted board of governors, but most importantly through the support of the parents of our fine players. Thank you for all that you continue to do to make this program one of the very best in the state!

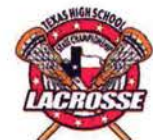

NORTH DI SEASON SUMMARY

JESUIT: (13-6)

Jesuit's record going into the Houston Super Regional is 13 wins and 6 losses. Jesuit's attack is anchored by Junior, All State selection Buck McClure and Junior Richie Sapp who have combined for over 80 points this season. Another player to watch in the playoffs for the Rangers is Senior Jack Ken. Ken has had a superb year and leads all Ranger midfielders in point production. A big reason for the Rangers' success this year has been the play of Sophomore face-off specialist Alex Petsos who has fared well against some of the country's best FOGOs. The Ranger defense is anchored by Senior, All State selection Brandon Bonvino and Senior, All District selection Doug Noah. Freshman goaltender Dan Morris has the capability of keeping the Rangers in every game regardless of who they play. Jesuit's year has been highlighted by its performance in the Jesuit Classic in Washington D.C. The Jesuit Classic is a round robin which includes some of the best Jesuit high school lacrosse programs in the country. Jesuit's best win of the year was a 5-4 nail bitter over Loyola Academy in the Classic. Jesuit came back from a 3 goal deficit to pull out a victory against Loyola in the final minutes of the game. Jesuit also beat Canisius High School from Buffalo, New York 14-2. The Rangers lost to Gonzaga High School from D.C. 6-3 and also lost to national power Georgetown Prep 14-5 in the Classic. The Rangers believe their extremely difficult out of state schedule has helped prepare them for the tough Texas opponents they will face in the THSLL playoffs.

HIGHLAND PARK: (12-2)

Highland Park, District Record (5-0), Overall Record (12 – 2) – Coming into this year, we knew this year's Highland Park team would be talented so the coaching staff tried to challenge our players with an extremely competitive regular season schedule. We hope this tough out-of-state competition has prepared us well for our stretch run and our district and state playoffs. SOUTH DI SEASON SUMMARY

Since 2005, an unchanged set of teams have competed in the South Division I District. For the 2010 season however, South DI welcomed the addition of three programs. Memorial, Cinco Ranch and St. Thomas all joined the top level of competition in the South District. Typical of first year Division I teams, all three struggled, however Memorial did manage a 3-6 record. Although time available for the regular season was shortened to make room for the new Super Regional playoffs, the South Division I coaches decided in the fall of 2009 to keep the traditional six team district playoff format to decide on the South District Championship. At the conclusion of the regular season, Woodlands was seeded #1, Episcopal Houston #2, Strake Jesuit #3, St. John's #4, Kingwood #5 and Kinkaid #6 for the District playoffs.

Congratulations are due to the South District 2010 Champions Episcopal Knights. In the words of Coach Mike Donnelly, "we won the games that counted". Gaining a second seed in the District playoffs, Episcopal started the season well, earning victories against St. Thomas (10-1), Cinco Ranch (17-6), Anderson (14-8), Memorial (16-12), before losing to Dallas Jesuit (6-13) and Coppell (7-13). In the District playoffs, the Knights offense started to click by defeating Strake Jesuit (14-10) in the semi-finals and went on to defeat St. John's (12-6) in the South District Championship. Travelling to Austin for the THSLL Super Regional, Episcopal Houston will face the winner of the Episcopal School of Dallas vs. Bowie game. Leading the Knights this year are seniors Mike Linter at defense and Parker Mason at attack, both of whom won All-State honors and are All-American nominees.

So did the District Playoffs hold true to form, based on the regular season seeding? Not hardly. St. John's beat Kingwood in a hard fought game (11-9) that saw numerous lead changes and ties. St. John's then went on to beat the number one seeded Woodlands team (10-9) in a semi-final game where the Woodlands normally potent offense failed to get a goal in the last three minutes of the game. Advancing to the District Championships again for the second year in a row, the Mavericks faced Episcopal Houston but lost (6-12). In the South Super Regional playoffs, St. John's earned a #2 seed and will face central district foe Westlake in the first round. Earning All State honors for St. Johns for 2010 were defenseman John Ytterberg, midfielder and All American nominee Reed Daniel and long stick middle William Payne.

For 2010, The Woodlands opened up district competition with eight straight district victories by beating St. John's (14-9), Cinco Ranch (16-6), Episcopal Houston (14-10), Kinkaid (7-5), Lamar (14-7), Kingwood (12-6), Memorial (13-6) and St. Thomas (15-6). In Inter-District play, The Highlanders faced 2009's THSLL State Champion Highland Park and were hammered (2-17), but returned the favor by beating Central District foe Bowie High (14-4). In what is developing into an annually anticipated rivalry game, the Woodlands faced Strake Jesuit to conclude the regular season, but lost disappointingly (7-13). In the first round of the South District Super Regional, the Woodlands will face a difficult Dallas Jesuit team they will have to defeat if they hope to advance to the State Championship. The Woodlands 2011 season looks bright with the return of sophomore Ian Seale at attack and junior midfielder Chase Rogers, both of whom won All State honors for the Woodlands.

In another solid season, the Strake Jesuit Crusaders went 13-6 overall and 7-2 in district games, with their two lone district losses against St. John's (4-5) and Episcopal Houston (7-11). Their signature victory in regular season was against the Woodland (13-7) to conclude the regular season. In the district playoffs, Strake got by Kinkaid (12-7) but stumbled against Episcopal Houston (10-14). Earning the fourth seed in the Central Super Regional, Strake Jesuit will face Anderson in the first round. If victorious against Anderson, Strake will play St. Marks in a rematch of the closely contested 2009 State semi-final game. Winning All State honors for Strake this year were All-American nominees Chris Duin (attack) and "the human clearing machine" Tyler McLamb at midfield.

Kingwood again made solid gains in 2010 winning 5 district games and losing 4, with wins against St. Thomas (15-4), Cinco Ranch (15-3), Memorial (11-9), Lamar (10-6) and Kinkaid (10-6). Making the District playoffs for 2010, Kingwood played against St. John's in the first round in a hard fought, but losing effort (9-11). Kingwood looks to be very strong for 2011 with the return of All State and All American nominee Patrick McClearn in goal, All State defenseman Hunter Henrick and All State attackman Ryan Delange.

Kinkaid went 5-4 in district games this season, earning wins against Memorial, St. Thomas (10-3), Cinco Ranch (13-5), Lamar (14-11) and the eventual District Champions Episcopal Houston (8-5). In the first round of the District playoffs, Kinkaid fell to Strake Jesuit (5-10). A bright spot for the Falcons this season was the performance of midfielder Graham Bayley, dominating the face off "X" while gaining All State honors and also All American consideration.

For 2011, the South District anticipates the addition of one or perhaps two teams moving up from Division II, at testament to not only the growth of high school lacrosse, but also its improvement in quality.

SOUTH DII SEASON SUMMARY

The South DII was split into two districts this year. District I had Houston Christian, Cy Fair, Klein, Taylor, Katy and Westside. All the teams are located west and northwest of Houston. Division II had Clear Lake, Fort Bend, Spartan Lacrosse, Bellaire, Friendswood Memorial DII and Pearland. These teams are located West, South and Southeast of Houston. The reasoning behind splitting the teams into two districts was due to a large amount of regular season games.

Cy Fair again had a good season as they have had in the past, but other teams like Clear Lake, Spartan Lacrosse, Klein and Fort Bend had good seasons also.

Houston Christian and Clear Lake won their respective divisions during the regular season. In Division I, Houston Christian was followed by Klein and then Cy Fair. Clear Lake in Division II was followed by Fort Bend, the Spartan Lacrosse. All six teams made up the THSLL South DII playoff teams. As of this writing, Houston Christian will play Cy Fair for the District I Championship and Clear Lake will play Spartan Lacrosse for the District II Championship.

The South DII district was very competitive this year due to the district format. More rivalry games were played that made a difference in the standings. Geographically having two districts made it easier on the teams for travelling also. I believe that the level of play has risen in the THSLL South DII due to a number of reasons. More teams have middle school feeder programs than in the past and the level of coaching expertise has risen in the district.

On a negative side we experienced some head injuries like we did last year, which were mainly concussions this season. Again we focused on prevention with the coaches and the referees demanding foresight in regards to the players on the field with expectations of the referees and coaches diffusing a situation prior to it happening. We also increased the penalties associated with calls during the game and multi game suspensions should a game ejection occur.

The district will have a second annual All Star game in May and is also placing many players on the THSLL South DII travelling team.

ROOSEVELT HIGH SCHOOL: (I-8)

This year was a challenge for the Roosevelt Riders. Having lost more than half the team from graduating seniors and a low recruiting turn out, the challenge was daunting. The team did step up and played hard in every game, many times with only one or two subs available at each game. And with the 2010 seniors leaving this year, next year will be a bigger challenge. But, everyone is ready to make an all out recruiting campaign and make the best of what is dealt and the players have been awesome facing their challenges and never giving up!

After last year's restructuring of their program and acceptance as a school-sponsored athletic team, the Yellowjackets were set for a strong rebuilding year in 2010. The Jackets notched their first wins as 100% St. Anthony student team and were able to play competitively with the rest of the conference. With all 4 post season honorees returning next year and only graduating three seniors, the Jackets are looking forward to next year. Hat's off to St. Anthony Assistant Coach Alex Torok for being awarded Assistant Coach of the Year for his work with St. Anthony's Goalies and defensive unit.

NORTH ALUMNI:

Highland Park High School Alumni and Denver Midfielder **Charley Dickenson** named as a candidate for the Lowe's 2010 Senior CLASS Award. THSLL and Plano West Senior High Alumni and U.S. Air Force Attackman **Ridge Flick** named as a candidate for the Lowe's 2010 Senior CLASS Award. Plano Senior High Alumni and Army Goalie **Tom Palesky** has been voted to the watch list for the 2010 Tewaaraton Award, which annually recognizes the top collegiate lacrosse player in the nation. Tom joins the list of 64 total athletes named to this year's list across all three NCAA divisions by a selection committee of college coaches from across the country. Tom finished 10th nationally and led the Patriot League with a .591 save percentage while also leading the conference with 12.75 saves per game and finishing second with an 8.89 goals against average in 2009. Credited with double-digit save totals in 13 of 16 contests, his 204 saves was the third-highest single-season total in Academy history. This season, Palesky has played every minute in goal for Army and registered a 21-save performance on Feb. 28 against two-time defending national champion Syracuse to garner Patriot League Goalkeeper of the Week recognition. The Tewaaraton Award list is made up of the top lacrosse players across all three divisions of collegiate lacrosse and are the early hopefuls for the 2010 Tewaaraton Trophy. Watch list nominees are screened and selected by two Selection Committees. The Selection Committees are comprised of college coaches, one committee for the men and one committee for the women. "I am excited to announce this year's watch list," said Robert Sweeney, President of the Greater Washington Sports Alliance. "The committee has done an outstanding job at selecting the top contenders across the country. This year's list represents 35 institutions, over 13 conferences encompassing students from 14 states, Canada and Australia, so if this is any indication of what is to come, I believe we are in store for an electrifying and intense season ahead." The Tewaaraton Award was formally established in August of 2000 and is the pre-eminent lacrosse award, which is given annually to the NCAA men's and women's lacrosse player of the year. Tradition dictates that each year the Tewaaraton Award celebrates one of the six tribal nations of the Iroquois Confederacy: the Mohawk, Cayuga, Oneida, Onondaga, Seneca, and the Tuscarora. This will be the 10th annual awards ceremony and is the "Year of the Seneca".

The Tewaaraton Award will be presented on June 3 at the Smithsonian National Museum of the American Indian in Washington, D.C. Traditionally, one of the six tribal nations of the Iroquois Confederacy is celebrated in conjunction with the award, and 2010 will be recognized as "Year of the Seneca." **Charley Dickenson** and **Ridge Flick** are two of twenty NCAA® men's lacrosse student-athletes who excel both on and off the field and were tabbed as candidates for the 2010 Lowe's Senior CLASS Award. To be eligible for the award, a student-athlete must be classified as an NCAA Division I senior and have notable achievements in four areas of excellence – classroom, character, community and competition. The complete list of candidates follows this release. An acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School™, the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award focuses on the total student-athlete and encourages students to use their platform in athletics to make a positive impact as leaders in their communities.

This year's candidate class includes 13 student-athletes on teams ranked in the Nike/Inside Lacrosse media preseason top 20 poll. In addition, nine candidates are on the preseason Inside Lacrosse Face-Off Yearbook Division I All-American list. Six candidates own cumulative grade point averages of 3.5 or better. Lowe's, an official Corporate Partner of the NCAA, will announce the 2010 Senior CLASS Award™ winner at the NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Championship at M&T Bank Stadium in Baltimore May 29-31. The 20 candidates will be narrowed to 10 finalists midway through the regular season, and those 10 names will be placed on the official ballot. Ballots will be distributed through a nationwide voting system to media, coaches and fans, who will select one finalist who best exemplifies excellence in the four Cs of classroom, character, community and competition. "The lacrosse candidates represent a diverse cross-section of universities and a wide array of academic courses of study," said Tom Lamb, Lowe's senior vice president of marketing. "But the common denominator is a passion for their sport and for finishing their careers as students and athletes at the top."

CENTRAL ALUMNI:

Notre Dame de Namur, a Division II lacrosse program in Belmont, California announced their 2010 Captains. Two local players who are in their Senior season at NDNU have been named. **Ryan Clark**, a defenseman from Anderson HS, and **Conrad Clevlen**, a midfielder from McNeil HS, have been key players for the Argonauts over the last 3 seasons and are recognized as team leaders.

Lacrosse, considered to be America's first sport, was born of the North American Indian, christened by the French, and adapted and raised by the Canadians. Modern lacrosse has been embraced by athletes and enthusiasts of the United States and the British Commonwealth for over a century.

The sport of lacrosse is a combination of basketball, soccer and hockey. Anyone can play lacrosse--the big or the small. The game requires and rewards coordination and agility, not brawn. Quickness and speed are two highly prized qualities in lacrosse.

THIS IS LACROSSE

An exhilarating sport, lacrosse is fast-paced and full of action. Long sprints up and down the field with abrupt starts and stops, precision passes and dodges are routine in men's and women's lacrosse. Lacrosse is played with a stick, the crosse, which must be mastered by the player to throw, catch and scoop the ball.

Lacrosse is one of the fastest growing team sports in the United States. Youth participation in the sport has grown over 500% since 1999 to nearly 250,000. No sport has grown faster at the high school level over the last 10 years and there are now an estimated 200,000 high school players. Lacrosse is also the fastest-growing sport over the last six years at the NCAA level, and that's just the tip of the iceberg. There are more than 500 college club programs, including nearly 200 women's teams that compete at the US Lacrosse Intercollegiate Associates level.

BRIEF HISTORY

With a history that spans centuries, lacrosse is the oldest sport in North America. Rooted in Native American religion, lacrosse was often played to resolve conflicts, heal the sick, and develop strong, virile men. To Native Americans, lacrosse is still referred to as "The Creator's Game."

Ironically, lacrosse also served as a preparation for war. Legend tells of as many as 1,000 players per side, from the same or different tribes, who took turns engaging in a violent contest. Contestants played on a field from one to 15 miles in length, and games sometimes lasted for days. Some tribes used a single pole, tree or rock for a goal, while other tribes had two goalposts through which the ball had to pass. Balls were made out of wood, deerskin, baked clay or stone.

The evolution of the Native American game into modern lacrosse began in 1636 when Jean de Brebeuf, a Jesuit missionary, documented a Huron contest in what is now southeast Ontario, Canada. At that time, some type of lacrosse was played by at least 48 Native American tribes scattered throughout what is now southern Canada and all parts of the United States. French pioneers began playing the game avidly in the 1800s. Canadian dentist W. George Beers standardized the game in 1867 with the adoption of set field dimensions, limits to the number of players per team and other basic rules.

New York University fielded the nation's first college team in 1877, and Philips Academy, Andover (Massachusetts), Philips Exeter Academy (New Hampshire) and the Lawrenceville School (New Jersey) were the nation's first high school teams in 1882. There are 400 college and 1,200 high school men's lacrosse teams from coast to coast.

The first women's lacrosse game was played in 1890 at the **St. Leonard's School in Scotland**. Although an attempt was made to start women's lacrosse at Sweet Briar College in Virginia in 1914, it was not until 1926 that Miss Rosabelle Sinclair established the first women's lacrosse team in the United States at the Bryn Mawr School in Baltimore, Maryland.

Men's and women's lacrosse were played under virtually the same rules, with no protective equipment, until the mid-1930s. At that time, men's lacrosse began evolving dramatically, while women's lacrosse continued to remain true to the game's original rules. Men's and women's lacrosse remain derivations of the same game today, but are played under different rules. Women's rules limit stick contact, prohibit body contact and, therefore, require little protective equipment. Men's lacrosse rules allow some degree of stick and body contact, although violence is neither condoned nor allowed.

Field lacrosse is sometimes perceived to be a violent and dangerous game, however, injury statistics prove otherwise. While serious injuries can and do occur in lacrosse, the game has evolved with an emphasis on safety, and the rate of injury is comparatively low. Ensuring the safety of participants is a major focus for US Lacrosse and its Sports Science and Safety Committee, which researches injury data in the sport and makes recommendations to make the game as safe as practicable.

ACCEPTABLE BEHAVIOR

- Know the rules and strategies of the game in order to cheer at proper times.
- Maintain enthusiasm and composure, serving as a role model.
- Participate positively in the game by supporting coaches and players.
- Exercise good judgment in cheering for outstanding performance, not against opponents or to ridicule an error. It is certainly acceptable to applaud all participants at the end of the contest.
- Be an exemplary role model by positively supporting teams in every manner possible including content of cheers and signs.
- Show respect and concern for an injured player – regardless of team.
- Respect decisions made by Officials.
- Realize that a ticket represents a privilege and a responsibility to observe and positively support a high school activity, not a license to verbally assault others or be obnoxious.
- Respect fans, coaches and participants.
- Encourage surrounding fans to display only sportsman-like conduct.
- Resist being drawn into negative conduct by other fans – including opposing fans.

UNACCEPTABLE BEHAVIOR

- Disrespectful or derogatory yells, songs, gestures, or cheers.
- Booing or heckling an official's decision, criticizing officials in any manner, displays of temper with an official's call.
- Yells that antagonize opponents.
- Blaming loss on officials, coaches or players.
- Yelling at or criticizing coaches or participants of either team.
- Attempting to coach from the bleachers or sidelines—giving specific instructions to a player.
- Destruction of property, signage or equipment.
- Running onto the field of play before, during or after the game.
- Engaging an opposing fan in a dispute or argument.
- Use of profane, vulgar, or abusive language.

NCAA RULE 2, SECTION 4

- The head coach also shall be in control of and be responsible for the actions of any and all persons officially connected with his or her institution.
- Coaches shall assist the officials in keeping the game under control. It shall be their duty, upon the request of an official, to control effectively actions of spectators not in conformity with standards of proper conduct.

THE FIELD

Lacrosse is played on a field approximately the size of a football field: 110 yards long by 60 yards wide. The goals are 6 feet square and are placed in a crease, which is a circle with a 9-foot radius. Offensive players are not allowed in the crease at any time during the game.

THE STICKS

The sticks used today are generally made of molded plastic with either a nylon mesh or a leather and nylon woven pocket, with either an aluminum, titanium or alloy handle. The sticks vary in length from 40 to 72 inches, depending upon the position played.

PLAYERS

There are 10 players in action at one time on a lacrosse team: a goalie, three defensemen, three midfielders, and three attackmen. At all times, a team must have three men on its offensive half of the field and four men on its defensive half.

GOALIE

The goalie's responsibility is to protect the goal and stop the opposing team from scoring. A good goalie also leads the defense by reading the situation and directing the defenseman to react. A good goalie should have excellent hand/eye coordination and a strong voice. Quickness, agility, confidence and the ability to concentrate are also essential. Each team has one goalie in the goal during play.

DEFENSEMEN

The defenseman's responsibility is to defend the goal. The defenseman generally restricts his play to the defensive end of the field. A good defenseman should be able to react quickly in game situations. Agility and aggressiveness are necessary, but great stick work is not essential to be effective. Each team should have three defensemen on the field.

MIDFIELDERS

The midfielder's responsibility is to cover the entire field, playing both offense and defense. The midfielder is key to the transition game, and is often called upon to clear the ball from defense to offense. A good midfielder demonstrates good stick work including throwing, catching and scooping. Speed and stamina are essential. Each team should have three midfielders on the field.

ATTACKMEN

The attackman's responsibility is to score goals. The attackman generally restricts his play to the offensive end of the field. A good attackman demonstrates excellent stick work with both hands and has quick feet to maneuver around the goal. Each team should have three attackmen on the field during play.

PLAYING THE GAME**OFFENSIVELY**

On offense, the attacking team will run set plays and formations just as a basketball team would, with cutters, picks (no moving picks allowed), and feeders. They will usually go one-on-one, or freelance. Naturally, there are numerous opportunities for fast breaks, or unsettled situations.

DEFENSIVELY

On defense, teams usually play man-to-man with a team concept of backups and slides to assist a teammate. When a person has the ball, a defensive player may check (hit) his stick or his hands in order to try to dislodge the ball. He may also deliver a body check to the player from the front between the waist and the shoulders. In addition, in a loose-ball situation, a player may hit any opponent within 5 yards of the ball in the same manner.
